The Referendums - Next Friday We Vote!

On Friday next, the 8th of March, we are being asked to vote in two Referendums.

The Family Amendment and the Care Amendment.

I would think there is a certain confusion about both, we're not sure of the where, the why, the reason or purpose of these referendums. Sometimes, you fear that in order to seem progressive and modern in our attitude, we are trying to negate the past. A tendency today to neutralise language and to diminish, to dilute what is important, and there is nothing more important than the family: where all human life is experienced and lived.

Families today come in all shapes, forms and configurations. The most important thing is that children feel loved and that they know they belong. Where possible, the commitment of marriage does contribute to the common good of society, it deserves protection. Sometimes marriage as an experience is life-giving, sometimes it isn't. Sometimes Priesthood/Religious life is similarly life-giving, sometimes it isn't. However, in the ideal sense, Marriage entails a public legal commitment. There is a generosity in making a commitment to another whether it is religious or civil. The words 'durable relationship' may lack clarity.

Various commentators have suggested that the term 'durable relationship' could lead to unforeseen and unintended consequences.

Then there is**The Care Amendment (40th Amendment)** which seems to delete reference to: Home, Woman and Mother. Reading the original statement of 1937, it does not state that a 'woman's place is in the home', neither does it excuse men of their duties to the home and family. It is reasonable to ask to what benefit will it be to remove such references of home, Mother, Woman. In contemporary life there now exists a welcome co-responsibility between women and men for every aspect of home life, including the role of caring. If change were deemed to be necessary, it would be reasonable to include: reference to parents, or to Mothers and Fathers, therefore respecting the core value of parenting in family life.

Whatever the outcomes of these referendums, will peoples' lives be improved? In the 20 million or so that will be spent, it won't change the lives of loving and caring parents: married or single, as they watch a child await surgery for the painful condition of scoliosis. It won't change the lives of young couples stretched and burdened by childcare and mortgage costs as both are forced to work.

When visiting young couples preparing for the Baptism of their child. Young Mothers on Maternity Leave will often say they are going to take unpaid leave for a period of time. They value that precious time with their new baby. They ought to have options, and, when returning to the work,

they should not be penalised, but resume, if they so desire, their position in the workplace where they can progress and advance their careers as is their right.

In the questions being posed by these referendums, sometimes, we need to assess what is important, what is of value.

Clarity is important and essential. Ambiguity is never helpful.

1st March - Feast of St. David.

1st March marks an age-old link between Wales and Kildare's county town.

The first days of the spring months are marked by the feast days of two great saints of the early Christian church in these islands. Here in Kildare we have celebrated the significance of the 1st February as the feast day of St. Brigid. The 1st of March is the feast day of Saint David. Now David might be thought of mainly as the patron saint of Wales but his memory is



also kept alive in Co. Kildare where, for some years now, the day is marked in Naas which, since the 12th century, has had a connection with the Pembrokeshire peninsula in south-west Wales.

St. David never visited Naas but rather he was imported in to the locality in the 12th century by the Normans who landed on the Wexford coast having crossed the Irish sea from Wales. The barony of Naas was granted to Maurice Fitzgerald who had family connections with the area of St. David's monastery and cathedral on the Pembrokeshire peninsula.

Mediaeval Naas acquired many of the features of a Norman outpost with a moat, mills, walls and gates all being recorded. But also the Normans brought a cultural impact to bear with traces of Norman-Welsh Culture being welded to existing Irish custom and practice.

One of the most striking similarities between Kildare and Pembrokeshire is in the names of townlands and localities. Overlay a townland map of Co. Kildare on to a map of south-west Wales and the coincidence of naming is remarkable. Townland names such as Herbertstown, Sherlockstown, Craddockstown are to be found in Pembrokeshire. An obvious Norman import for example is Kerdiffstown (as in Cardiff in Wales) and it may come as a surprise to Kildare folk that there is another Punchestown – in this case near Fishguard on the Pembrokeshire peninsula.

When the new Catholic church was built in 1827 on the Sallins Road in Naas it was named after Our Lady & St. David. However it seemed as if the connection between Kildare's county town and Wales might have faded completely in the twentieth century until in 1990 a number of local historians in Naas succeeded in influencing the Urban Council to conclude an official twinning between Naas and the cathedral city of St. David's. So, this March the Welsh dragon will fly outside the Town Hall in Naas as it might have flown over the town back in the 12th century when the Normans found space – among all the Irish saints – for the patron saint of Wales. *(Thanks to Liam Kenny, full article available on the parish website and app.)*
